Minnesota Adult and Teen Challenge receives supplemental group housing rate to provide all-encompassing services at new facility

Funding will be critical to support substance abuse treatment and co-occuring mental health services

MINNEAPOLIS – Minnesota Adult & Teen Challenge (MnTC) broke ground on a new men's treatment facility in Alexandria last year that will address the dire need for substance use treatment and co-occurring mental health services in western Minnesota, underscoring the organization's commitment to its mission.

As part of Human Services Omnibus bill SF2934, legislation, championed by Senator Jordan Rasmusson (Fergus Falls) and Representative Jeff Backer (Browns Valley), was successfully passed this session. This legislation introduces a supplemental group housing rate, which will play a crucial role in facilitating comprehensive services at the new facility. "The Alexandria community has recognized the significance of this new facility, responding to the urgent need for these crucial services. We express our gratitude for the unwavering support from legislators, enabling us to extend our services to hundreds more Minnesotans annually," stated Tom Truszinki, CEO of MnTC.

Joining the cause, several other area legislators supported the legislation, including Senator Torrey Westrom (Elbow Lake), Representative Mary Franson (Alexandria), Representative Paul Anderson (Starbuck), and Representative Tom Murphy (Underwood).
